As I look back at my time as president of the Greene County Memorial Hospital Foundation I am filled with a great deal of pride and sense of accomplishment. When the hospital was sold in the fall of 2005, there was a great deal of uncertainty both with the hospital and the newly formed Foundation that received all of the hospital's assets and liabilities.

Once my fellow directors and I completed the tasks of being certain all of the pensions were fully funded, and all outstanding debts were settled, we then looked to find various ways to improve the health and well-being of the residents of Greene County.

In the ensuing years the Foundation provided funding to dozens of local nonprofit organizations, along with nearly fifty individuals looking to pursue secondary education in health care. All told the Foundation contributed nearly \$2 million in the years to come, but we felt we could do more.

After much investigation and discussion we determined Greene County could desperately use an indoor recreation facility. Although this would turn out to be a large and somewhat expensive project we were

determined to see it through and the response to the EQT REC Center these past two years clearly justified our beliefs and we are thrilled.

On the pages that follow are additional programs and services we supported this past year we felt greatly benefited our community. All of these programs are made possible by the generous contributions of organizations and individuals who share our commitment to the residents of Greene County. On behalf of my fellow trustees, thank you for displaying your trust in us to further advance the health and well-being of all those who reside in our fine community. The future has never been brighter and we look forward to many more years of serving the community.

History of Greene County Memorial Hospital Foundation

Greene County Memorial Hospital Foundation (GCMHF) was formed as the result of the sale of Greene County Memorial Hospital in October, 2005 to Essent Healthcare, a for-profit organization based in Nashville TN. The hospital traces its roots to the years 1904 and 1905 when two Waynesburg physicians, Dr. Harry C. Scott and Dr. Frank Ullom, opened the first hospital in Greene County.

By 1907 the hospital earned accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals and the Department of Public Welfare in recognition of its programs and professionalism. Twenty years later Waynesburg Hospital officially changed its name to Greene County Memorial Hospital and began operating as a non-profit corporation.

GCMH continued to grow in response to the needs of the community and with the support of the Auxiliary, built a completely modern three-story facility. The 88-bed hospital officially opened in February, 1938. Over the decades to come, the hospital built many additions to the original structure, concluding with a five-story addition which was completed in 1976.


Today the original hospital, now known as Washington Health System Greene, and GCMHF are doing their part to advance healthcare initiatives throughout the county. With the help of many supporters, funding has been provided to dozens of organizations for the express purpose of advancing the health and well-being of all Greene County residents.

What's new at the Foundation's EQT REC Center?

In November of 2017, the Greene County Memorial Hospital Foundation opened the EQT REC Center following much anticipation.



By the end of 2019, membership had surpassed 3,600 members and many groups and individuals took advantage of the facility by renting out the community rooms, party rooms and even the conference room, which was exactly the hope the board of directors had when they green-lighted the project a few years ago.

Over the past twelve months many new programs have been instituted such as wrestling camps, basketball camps, summer camps, and leagues for youth flag football, adult basketball, and pickleball. Additional fitness classes have also been added due to requests from members who wanted more than the standard forty classes per week that were originally offered.



During the school year the EQT REC Center also serves as an afterschool destination for students in the Waynesburg area. They can get help with their homework or just take advantage of the countless activities available to them until mom or dad can pick them up a few hours later at the end of their work day.

GCMH Foundation is thrilled to be able to bring a facility to life for this area and is very thankful for the support it has received in helping to fund this multimillion dollar project, as to date more than \$2.6 million has been pledged from local organizations and individuals.

Greene County Career and Technology Center Receives Grant to Aid Nursing Students

For the eighth consecutive year, GCMHF approved a grant to Greene County Career and Technology Center. Each year the foundation provides funding to the center in order to purchase mandatory equipment for each nursing student. The equipment comes in a duffel bag the student gets to keep upon graduation and contains much of what they need to master prior to taking their nursing board exams.

Judy Swauger, Coordinator of Practical Nursing Program, knows this gives her students an advantage by utilizing their own medical equipment, kits and supplies. "Nurses are the backbone of the healthcare system. The Greene County Career & Technology Center has been educating nurses in Greene County since 1970. They learn, practice and demonstrate proficiency in nursing skills prior to clinical rotations at our various facilities. They then utilize those skills throughout their career."



The practical nursing program partners with various civic organizations to assist in promoting health and wellness within the community. A few examples are:

- Cornerstone Care's Smile for Life Program
- Community Action's Head Start
- Rainbow's End
- Blood pressure screenings at local sites
- American Cancer Society's Relay for Life

Along with completing all coursework, students must work more than 1,600 hours in order to graduate.

Corner Cupboard Foodbank Receives Assistance

Corner Cupboard was founded in October 1992, to address the needs of the hungry population in Greene County. Its humble beginnings started out in the basement of the County Office Building with a dedicated handful of volunteers who hand loaded every order.

Today, more than 20 years later, Corner Cupboard has increased capacity to feed well over 2,000 people every month, through a network of 11 pantries throughout the county. With the dedication of 2 full-time staff members, 11 Pantry Coordinators, 8 Board Members, and more than 150 Volunteers, Corner Cupboard is truly a community effort of "Neighbors Helping Neighbors".



Over the years the Greene County Memorial Hospital Foundation has contributed more than \$100,000 to the Foodbank. The Foundation stepped up once again to assist the Foodbank with a grant of \$10,000 this year.

For the second year in a row through a joint effort with the Community Foundation of Greene County, the Foundation contributed \$10,000 for a weekend food program for 2019/2020 school year. The Weekend Food Program began with two schools and thirty-six children back in April, 2012. It now provides bags of food to more than 150 elementary age school children throughout the five schools districts within the county. These children have been identified by school personnel as high risk food insecure and typically show signs/symptoms of coming to school hungry.

Executive Director of the Food Bank, Candace Tustin, was thrilled to receive the great news and grateful for the continued support of the Hospital Foundation. For every \$1 that is donated to the food bank, they can purchase \$5 worth of food. Ms. Tustin stated that monetary donations and contributions like that of GCMHF are essential to continuing the mission of the food bank

By partnering with the Community Foundation at the beginning of the school year, the schools were able to get the program started earlier and be confident of the number of children they can serve throughout the year. In the past, many of the schools had to wait and were unsure as to the numbers they could serve due to limited funds.

In addition, GCMHF also donated \$5,000 directly to Corner Cupboard to assist in their operational costs. Trucks, freezers and other large pieces of equipment necessary to maintain a busy and active program often need to be addressed, fixed or even replaced and most of the money the foodbank receives are rightfully ear-marked for food, many times leaving very little left over for mechanical issues that may arise.

GCMH Foundation Awards Catholic Charities \$5,000 for Rollercoasters Program


Catholic Charities Rollercoasters Program is provided for any schools in Greene County that wish to participate. Through interactive games, stories and activities the students who participate will learn coping skills that are valuable to all individuals but particularly to those who are dealing with family change.

For the ninth consecutive year GCMH Foundation has provided funding for this very vital program. Eleven separate groups for grades 1-5 participated in the eight week program consisting of the following themes:

- Understanding healthy ways to adjust to change in family dynamics
- Dealing with divorce and other life changes and realizing they are not the child's fault
- Grieving helps us move forward, making room for new experiences and growth
- Organizing feelings around events and experiences to improve self-esteem
- Discovering healthy coping skills to deal with anger and sadness
- Problem solving skills
- Preparing for new changes
- Synthesizing what has been learned

Many of the students who participated in the programs were from a split family home and more than half of these children reported thinking about their families' problems often. Measurable results indicated more than 90 percent of the children had reportable improvements in their behavior, with more than 98 percent improving their coping skills from the first to final session. Additionally, five students were referred to their guidance counselor for further support.

In many instances teachers were able to notice dramatic results. They reported the program helps them better understand and help their students and commented many more students were able to talk about their feelings.



Greene County Memorial Hospital Foundation awards \$10,000 in scholarships to five area graduates.

In May, the Greene County Memorial Hospital Foundation (GCMHF) once again awarded five scholarships to graduating seniors, one from each of the local school districts. The winners each received \$2,000 and intend to pursue a career in healthcare.

This is the twelfth consecutive year GCMHF has awarded healthcare scholarships to graduating seniors from Greene County. Combined with various nursing and medical student tuition assistance programs, GCMHF has awarded more than \$300,000 over the past ten years to Greene County students pursuing secondary healthcare degrees.

Coalition For a Brighter Greene Receives Another Grant

GCMH Foundation approved a grant of nearly \$10,000 for The Coalition for a Brighter Greene to conduct the Botvin Life Skills Program. The Coalition's mission is to facilitate continuous progress towards a drug-free Greene County by promoting efforts that further the purpose by creating positive, sustainable change.

Botvin *LifeSkills Training* (LST) is an evidence-based substance abuse and violence prevention program used in schools and communities throughout the US and in 39 countries around the world. LST has been extensively tested and proven to reduce tobacco, alcohol, and illicit drug use by as much as 80%. It is effective when implemented with different delivery formats, when taught by different providers, and when delivered to different populations. It also works with elementary school, middle school, and high school students. Long-term follow-up studies show that it produces prevention effects that are durable and long-lasting.



This comprehensive evidence-based curriculum is taught in all five school districts, grades 3-9. It provides adolescents and young teens with the confidence, skill, and knowledge necessary to successfully handle peer pressure and to make better choices. It has been proven to cut drug abuse by as much as 75% and alcohol abuse by 60%. These elements support and help insure academic and social success.
